We have reached out to approximately 4000 beneficiaries, which is a testament to our commitment to creating a lasting impact.

Furthermore, our organization's philanthropic culture is based on the principles of equality, inclusivity, and compassion. We are committed to enabling various platforms and events where our employees can volunteer, interact, and contribute to creating a better tomorrow for society. 





CANCER CARE – SUPPORTING BRAVEHEARTS

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: ACCESS LIFE ASSISTANCE FOUNDATION



The Lancet Oncology Commission forecasted in 2020 that over the next three decades, around 13.7 million children will be diagnosed with cancer, with 11.1 million dying if healthcare services and cancer treatment are not prioritised. Every year, nearly 50,000 children in India are diagnosed with cancer, which equates to one child every 11 minutes. Financial constraints, the use of alternative medicines/ natural remedies, and widespread misconceptions about cancer being incurable frequently contribute to delayed diagnosis and restricted access to thorough therapy, with 80% of children abandoning treatment.

In response to this critical circumstance, we have partnered with the Access Life Assistance Foundation to assist disadvantaged families traveling to Mumbai for cancer treatment for their children. This collaboration includes assistance with accommodation, food, transportation, and counseling services, with the primary purpose of providing high-quality cancer care so that families can focus on their child's treatment.

We support Access Life Assistance Foundation's Chembur and Bandra centers that seek to provide continuing therapy, education, and awareness to families, emphasizing that children's cancer is curable. Our dedication to this collaboration seeks to alleviate the strain on families during this difficult time and raise the possibility of positive outcomes for their child's health.



Enjamamul Haque (3.7 years old) Samsi, West Bengal,



Enjamamul Haque (3.7 years old) of Samsi, West Bengal, was suffering from fever and body ache. His parents took him to the doctor and had an X-Ray taken of him. The reports were normal. Several other tests were performed, including an X-ray, a CT scan, and a blood test. The reports were all normal. The fever abated, but there was a return after a few days. They then travelled to Kolkata to the Neel Ratan Hospital. The doctor there reassessed him and concurred that Enjamamul had less blood in his body, informing the parents that their child has Blood Cancer. Following advice, the parents travelled to Mumbai to Tata Hospital.

When the family met MSW, they were residing at Noori Majid in Mumbai since they need lodging for a longer length of time. Enjamamul and his family then came to Access Life, and the family is now happy and comfortable because their major difficulty has been remedied.



SAVE LITTLE HEARTS: CHD PROGRAM

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: AISHWARYA TRUST



Our partnership with Aishwarya Trust aims to lower the prevalence of congenital heart disease (CHD) in children and provide access to high-quality healthcare services through CHD screening. We assist Aishwarya Trust to administer a comprehensive CHD Program in Tamil Nadu that includes screening children from economically disadvantaged backgrounds for CHD and assist those identified with CHD in receiving the best possible treatment in the country. Aishwarya Trust regularly runs screening camps under the aegis of the Rashtriya Bal Swasthya Karyakram (RBSK) Program at Medical College Hospitals in Tamil Nadu as well as other locations around the country.

The purpose of these camps is to identify children and young adults from marginalised backgrounds who are suffering from CHD and need surgical intervention. A competent, renowned, and committed team of surgeons at Aishwarya Trust conducts the surgery and provides care to children. Within a week following surgery, the children are able to resume their normal live and can return to school almost immediately. Consequently, their chances of leading a quality life are increased.

CASE STUDY



Sakthi S. (10 Years / Male) from **Vizhupuram** whose father is a daily wager was screened and diagnosed with TOF with PA, Large Sub-Aortic VSD with 50% aortic over riding. The family requested Aishwarya Trust for support and the child underwent VSD Surgical Closure on 19.07.2022. After the successful surgery, the child was discharged on 26.07.2022



Subasri (6 Years/Female) from **Vizhupuram,** whose father is a driver was screened and diagnosed with DORV, VSD, Large Malaligned Sub Aortic VSD. The family could not afford the surgery costs and requested Aishwarya Trust for support and the child underwent VSD Surgical closure on 21.07.2022 After successful surgery, the child was discharged on 25.07.2022











FACE FORWARD: EMPOWERING LIVES WITH CLEFT, MAXILLOFACIAL & **CRANIOFACIAL SURGERIES**

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: INGA HEALTH FOUNDATION



Craniofacial and facial deformities can have long-term consequences for children, resulting in social stigma and social exclusion. This can have a negative psychological impact on their early schooling and social functioning, putting them at a substantial disadvantage.

To address this issue, we are collaborating with the INGA Health Foundation with the primary purpose of supporting their vision of attaining a cleft-free India while simultaneously increasing awareness about craniofacial and maxillofacial deformities. By raising awareness in society, we hope to eliminate the social stigma associated with facial deformities by enhancing public knowledge and improve the quality of life for the children and enable them to prosper socially and economically.





Karishma Malla (10 months/ Female) from Karnataka was diagnosed with Hemifacial Microsomia that was affecting the right side of her face. Her treatment included

Distraction Osteogenesis of mandible using 2 cm distractors. She underwent Craniofacial Midlevel Stage 1 surgery successfully.




Sahana Begum (15 years/ Female) from Karnataka was diagnosed with Ptosis of Bilateral Eye. Her treatment comprised of Correction of Ptosis. She underwent maxillofacial surgery successfully.









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BRIGHT SIGHT : CHANGING LIVES THROUGH KERATOPLASTY & RETINOPATHY SURGERIES

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: BLIND PEOPLE'S ASSOCIATION (BPA)



Cataracts, or clouding of the natural lens of the eye, are a major cause of blindness in India, particularly among the poor and vulnerable. However, at the village and rural levels, there is inadequate knowledge regarding cataract surgeries and corrective eye therapies, compounding the problem. To address this, we have partnered with Blind People's Association (BPA) in Gujarat to promote eye care for marginalized and underprivileged communities. This partnership aims to reduce unnecessary blindness and improve quality of life by treating the underlying causes of blindness and providing access to critical medical equipment and expertise, with a primary focus on retina and cornea procedures.

CASE STUDY





Reshma (name changed) noticed a white spot on the cornea of her right eye. She was in pain, and her eyes were red and watering. She was diagnosed with macular corneal opacity after her second consultation with the doctor. Keratoplasty surgery was suggested. Her procedure took place successfully at the Bareja Eye Hospital and her vision was restored.

TRANSFORMING LIVES THROUGH EDUCATION: SUPPORT TO ASEEMA BAL SHAIKSHANIK KENDRA (ABSK) **IGATPURI SCHOOL**

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: ASEEMA CHARITABLE TRUST



We have partnered with Aseema to fund the Aseema Bal Shaikshanik Kendra (ABSK) Igatpuri School, providing guality education to children from tribal and underprivileged communities. Aseema's educational philosophy emphasises student-centered classrooms, activity-based and experiential learning, cooperation, and collaboration. During the pandemic, Aseema swiftly responded to the nationwide lockdown with strategies such as delivering and. distributing gadgets to address technology access disparities, recalibrating curricular goals, providing intensive mentorship, and conducting online co-curricular activities to keep students motivated and engaged. The curriculum at ABSK Igatpuri School includes computer literacy and co-curricular activities like music, arts, and sports, allowing students to discover and develop their abilities across physical, emotional, cognitive, and social domains. Aseema's focus on targeted remediation, accelerated learning models, and continuous professional development levels the playing field for marginalized students in a safe and nurturing environment, achieving equity and guality. In FY23, our support benefited 374 students in ABSK Igatpuri School.

ANANDO SCHOOL EMPOWERMENT PROJECT: SUPPORT TO JANATA VIDYALAYA LOWJEE AND LOKMANYA TILAK MADHYAMIK VIDYALAYA, VASRANG KHOPOLI

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: LIGHT OF LIFE TRUST



With the one of highest number of out-of-school children in the world, India today confronts a big issue. Although the government has made various measures and seen strategies that focus only on students may not be adequate to fulfil overall educational goals. To provide an excellent education, it is critical to include all stakeholders in a child's life. To address this problem, HDFC Credila is working with Light of Life Trust to improve the quality of education at two rural government schools in Karjat, Maharashtra: Janata Vidyalaya Lowjee and Lokmanya Tilak Madhyamik Vidyalaya, Vasrang Khopoli.

This collaboration seeks to strengthen interactive classroom procedures for teachers, enhance holistic academic development, and create effective modalities of parent and community connection. The emphasis is on increasing participation of all major stakeholders in a child's life to ensure that they stay in school and finish their basic education. The programme intends to build, activate, and strengthen the partnership between schools, parents, and students to develop responsible citizens of a young and dynamic India. We assisted 229 students through this project.























EDU-EQUITY: SUPPORT TO GLOBE MILLS PASSAGE SECONDARY SCHOOL, MUMBAI

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: MUKTANGAN EDUCATION TRUST



The significance of systemic change in education has gained widespread recognition, inspiring Muktangan to create.

The Muktangan approach is built on childfriendly pedagogy and an Active

Constructivist Approach, which promotes a cognitive learning process that allows learners to generate new concepts by comparing and expanding on prior experiences. In collaboration with the Municipal Corporation of Greater Mumbai (MCGM), Muktangan has developed an integrated model of inclusive teacher and school education, encompassing pre-service and in-service teacher training, as well as seven municipal schools which are led by community members and serve 4,000 children aged 4 to 16 years old, particularly from underprivileged populations in Worli, Prabhadevi, and Parel (Mumbai).

We have collaborated with Muktangan Education Trust to support their research and promote a 'total systems approach' that enables marginalised communities to be change agents and bridges the educational divide between the 'haves and the have-nots'. We have supported the operating expenses of Muktangan's Globe Mills Passage Secondary School in Mumbai, benefiting 434 students. Therefore, this collaboration between HDFC Credila and Muktangan aims to provide equal access to education, minimize school dropout rates, promote holistic development in children, and create a nurturing and safe learning environment for underserved communities.

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: THE AKANKSHA FOUNDATION



We have partnered with The Akanksha Foundation (TAF) a nonprofit organization dedicated to empowering underprivileged children through education. Our goal with this partnership is to aid TAF in their Alumni Support Engagement Programme, which assists former TAF students in keeping focused on their education and attaining their academic and career goals. One of the programme's key objectives is to ensure that all TAF graduates finish their 12th grade. TAF graduates receive thorough counselling, career coaching, and financial help. The Company's assistance has enabled TAF to increase its efforts and aid more students in reaching their full potential and finishing their 12th standard education. As a result of this partnership, the Company has been able to support scholarships for 222 students to pursue higher education.

In addition, this year we have also extended support to the Harvard Young Leaders Circle (YLC) Program. This initiative promotes equitable access to higher education among vulnerable sections of society and identifies talented individuals who can benefit from personalized academic and career guidance.

CASE STUDY

Name: Prajwal Gayen (SSC: 86%) College: Mithibai College, Mumbai



Prajwal is a high performing student who aspires to become an Engineer and aims to get into an IIT level or equivalent engineering college. He was taking support from AF's partner organization ClayLab (online science classes) in FYJC for science subjects. With the level of difficulty rising in the Second year and to notch up and work towards his aspirations he decided to join coaching classes that will prepare him not only for HSC exams but also for entrance

exams for engineering degree. He is also an Alumni Ambassador with the ASE team and also got selected and participated in Ashoka YSP program last year (21-22) on 100% scholarship. Prajwal has received 90% of the college fees as reimbursement and support for ClayLab classes fees, a total of Rs. 7,405/- as financial aid. In AY 2022-23 he is eligible for 80% of the college fees and support of Coaching classes fees, a total of Rs 30,893/- disbursed to him as a part of the financial aid policy from the Akanksha Foundation



GIRL CHILD EMPOWERMENT - OVERVIEW



Our goal is to reduce gender disparities. We work to rescue girls from slums, red-light areas and adolescent girls from underprivileged communities; empowering them through shelter, nourishment, sexual and menstruation awareness, educational assistance, and counselling services.







PROJECT NAUNIHAL

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: PRERANA

Naunihal, operated by Prerana, is a girls' home that operates in compliance with the Juvenile Justice Act of 2000. Its primary purpose is to provide emergency shelter for girls from the red-light areas of Mumbai who are vulnerable and at risk of being trafficked for sexual exploitation. As the government's designated initial

point of contact for emergency shelter, Naunihal provides roundthe-clock care and protection for girls in need, as referred by the Raigad Child Welfare Committee, many of whom have been victims of sexual crimes or human trafficking. Upon referral to Naunihal, the girls receive care for a duration of six weeks to a year or more, depending on their individual requirements.

Prerana ensures that the infrastructure, processes, and practices at Naunihal are child-safe, and it also encourages the girls' access to long-term formal education and career training. The main objective is to nurture physical and mental growth and development in the girls while building confidence in them. The Naunihal team continues to follow up with the girls even after they have been reunited with their parents, offering additional aftercare support services such as educational and vocational links, rehabilitative aid, and personality development activities.

We have partnered with Prerana to assist the Naunihal initiative, which aims to provide a safe haven for girls who have suffered or are at danger of sexual offences, as well as other girls in need of care and protection.

KISHORI VIKAS PRAKALP -URJITA PROJECT

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: SEVA SAHYOG FOUNDATION



We have partnered with Seva Sahyog Foundation to support the Kishori Vikas Prakalp - Urjita Project, an initiative aimed at promoting the holistic development of adolescent girls from lowincome families.

This partnership aims to develop an all-encompassing physical and mental support system that improves decision-making abilities and boosts safety awareness in the setting of anti-social circumstances. We strive to minimize absenteeism during menstruation and increase participation in school and community activities by enhancing personal hygiene practices amongst adolescent girls. In addition, we also seeks to increase their interest in science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and design by introducing them to more of these subjects.

Through this collaboration, we have supported 20 clusters in Pune, benefiting a total of 1074 girls. This support focuses on boosting their confidence and giving them the opportunity to express themselves, allowing them to attain their greatest potential.

WASH & SANITATION -OVERVIEW



Our aim is to Clean Sanitation Facilities (separate and hygienic toilets for boys and girls), as well as improve access to Clean Drinking Water (separate drinking and dish wash areas) in government schools in order toestablish safe sanitation

practices and reduce school drop-out rates due to a lack of clean and safe drinking water and toilets.





SCHOOL TRANSFORMATION PROJECT: CATALYZING SCHOOL TRANSFORMATION THROUGH WASH FACILITIES

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: YUVA UNSTOPPABLE



Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) programs are vital in schools as they play a critical role in improving primary education access, reducing child mortality, promoting gender equality, and enhancing water and sanitation facilities. Access to clean water, age-appropriate

bathrooms, and handwashing facilities in schools also aid in illness prevention and enhance children's attendance and learning results.

However, approximately half of India's schools lack basic WASH facilities and clean drinking water, posing a substantial hurdle. Hence, it is critical to address this issue by providing separate restrooms and menstrual hygiene management facilities for females, since this can assist in minimizing school dropout rates, absenteeism, early marriage, and pregnancy.

Recognizing the significance of clean water, sanitation, and healthy behaviors for children's health, learning, and overall development, we worked with Yuva Unstoppable to assist its School Transformation initiative. This effort focuses on building WASH infrastructure in government high schools, including building toilets, handwashing areas, clean drinking water facilities, mid-day meal spaces, and multipurpose shade areas. As part of this collaboration, WASH activities have been launched in three government schools, benefiting a total of 222 students so far.


CHILD EMPOWERMENT -OVERVIEW



Our mission is to rescue street or homeless children while also reducing existing inequities in housing, education, sanitation, and nutrition.

Thus, we strive to ensure shelter, educational support, employment assistance, counselling, healthcare, and nourishment to street-rescued boys and girls.





PROJECT HORIZON: EMPOWERING INDIA'S YOUTH WITH SALAAM BAALAK TRUST

IMPLEMENTATION PARTNER: SALAAM BAALAK TRUST

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With a population of over 1.2 billion people, India holds the unfortunate record of having the largest population of street children in the world. This is the most vulnerable population, and the challenges surrounding their care affect both industrialised and developing countries, albeit to varying degrees and effects. The Salaam Baalak Trust (SBT) is dedicated to recognising and protecting the rights of street children by providing them with an integrated 'network of services' to assist them in reaching their developmental objectives. The programmes have developed from a needs-based to a rights-based approach, providing these children with options for a brighter future. This method emphasises comprehensive development and attempts to integrate them as productive individuals into mainstream society. SBT offers a variety of services to both boys and girls who have been rescued from the streets, including housing, education, counselling, healthcare, and nourishment.

We have collaborated with the Salaam Baalak Trust to provide infrastructure and maintenance support to three shelter houses in Andheri East and Kandivali (Boys' Centres), and Malad West (Girls' Center). With this collaboration, we have been able to support 300 street-rescued children by offering educational support, nutritional food, employment help, counselling, healthcare, and housing.

IMPACT ASSESSMENT – OVERVIEW

We support Aseema in delivering top-tier education to underprivileged children, elevating educational standards, and aiding in the realization of Aseema's mission and vision—to furnish exceptional education while fostering comprehensive development among children in marginalized communities.

To gauge the impact of this initiative, we onboarded a third-party impact assessment consultancy, SoulAce, to undertake the impact evaluation.

The research methodology employed a descriptive design, utilizing semi-structured survey tools to gather both qualitative and quantitative data from students and teachers. Additionally, virtual interviews were held with school leaders and various stakeholders associated with Aseema, delving into the intricate details of challenges encountered and their subsequent resolutions. The study encompassed a sample size of 100 students. The full impact assessment report can be accessed in this <u>link:</u>

Major Findings

Curriculum The curriculum was redesigned for remote teaching and an updated teaching manual was provided to teachers.

- The collaborative, multi-step process of curating, reviewing, and transacting the curriculum included mapping the learning outcomes, creating a year plan, preparing templates, creating digital teaching aids, creating practice sheets, and updating the learning tracker.
- The quality of the materials was reviewed by the Curriculum team, the Education Director, and external experts.

Teacher Professional Development

Teachers were provided professional development through an application-oriented approach, focusing on topics such as digital literacy, resource and classroom management in a virtual setting, adapting the curriculum for remote teaching, and finding ways to ensure students' psychological wellbeing.

Digital Literacy

The access issue was addressed by providing digital devices and reloading data packs. Moreover, teachers and students received brief but thorough instruction in digital competency to help them cultivate a range of skills that could be used to facilitate distant education.

Transacting the Remedial & Bridge Courses

• For learning recovery, a bridge course was created with core skills and concepts. Whole class teaching and ability-based grouping were used to teach the bridge course, using a flipped learning model to promote independent learning and individualized guidance during live sessions. For students facing difficulty, special study groups provided the opportunity for teachers to address their specific doubts and misunderstandings.

- Students were divided into ability-based groups for targeted support, using a remediation curriculum focused on literacy and numeracy skills. Different digital platforms and apps were used to create an effective and engaging learning experience.
- Google Classroom was used as a learning management tool, with worksheets provided for practice. Assessments were given via Google Forms and WhatsApp to track progress, and a Learning Outcomes Tracker was used to monitor student performance over time.
- High school students were given personalized attention and study timetables through a mentorship program, with 10 students assigned to one teacher for comprehensive analysis and board exam preparation.

Community Engagement

The Aseema team used the Community Work Centre (CWC) to reach out to parents, CBOs, and the community. The CWC Head worked with the School Head to raise attendance, provide meals, and attend to health needs. The CWC team were wellness coaches and therapists, academic advisors, conflict mediators, and friends. They spread knowledge of COVID-19 and its prevention, gave out supplies, helped students adjust to online and offline learning, and helped families manage the difficulty of the situation.

Key Challenges

- Access to digital devices, internet, and digital literacy posed a challenge in the beginning.
- Attendance and engagement improved once students and teachers were trained to work remotely, although a small number found it difficult to become proficient with digital tools and adapt to a remote learning environment.
- Some students faced issues such as a non-conducive home environment, lack of support, lack of motivation, and socioemotional issues, while a few teachers had difficulty with content, attendance, activities, and assessment.

Recommendations

- Integrate Learning with Digital Tools
- Build a Robust Professional Learning Community (PLC)
- Expand Outreach
- Foster Innovation
